Veteran's Home.

The annual Report of the Board of Directors and officers of the Veteran's Home at Yountville for the year ending June 30th, 1902 has been issued from the State Printing office. The statistics set forth therein are of interest and we give some of the totals as follows:

Membership of Home, June 30th, 1902; 771. The average number present each day during year 735. The average age of members is 65 years. The total admissions to June 30th, 1902, is 3421. Number of deaths during the year 60, which is 14 less than in 1901. The Secretary's report shows receipts of\$178,316,08, including cash on hand of \$373.09.
