THE action of the Chamber of Commerce of Fort Bragg in reviewing its action in endorsing a particular route through Mendocino county for the state highway shows that the body is composed of unprejudiced men and that they have decided that Mendocino county must be a unit to secure a fair break with the remainder of the state. It is up to every section of Mendocino county to pull for the state highway for Mendocino county and then settle its particular location afterwards. It is plain to the thinking man that the present board have will not continue to complete the state highway in the state that is contemplated and that the counties that do not vote all factions and sections in a pull for the road will be left out. Most of the counties have already realized this and are making a fight in the name of the whole county.

UKIAHITES are living up to the necessity of the road and for the past two years have been doing some considerable work. The citizens have raised \$1200 for supplying pumps to furnish water for sprinkling the lake county and Fort Bragg. \$500 was raised to survey the new Bonville grade; the citizens donated their time and money in repairing the river road last year and this year they have with the aid of Hopland raised \$500 to put the old mountain road in shape for travel all of the year. Such enterprise is bound to develop the community and to relegate the ancient to the background. A united community can accomplish wonders.


