BLIND PIG CASES ARE KNOCKED OUT

Word was received here the first of the week by Preston and Preston, attorneys for the defendants, that the court of appeals had sustained their contention in the cases against the blind pig keepers. The cases will now be appealed at the Superior Court. The case hinged on the validity of the ordinance recently passed by the Board of Supervisors raising the fine to \$500 in cases of this kind, thus throwing them into the Superior court. The ordinance was made the basis of attack by Preston and Preston, they claiming that the Board of Supervisors had no authority to pass an ordinance of this nature.

It is stated by the District Attorney's office that a number of complaints against the blind pig keepers have been held in abeyance pending the settlement of this controversy and that they will be reentered on these new cases and tried in the justice courts if the Supreme court upholds the court of appeals.

IRRIGATION PUMP IS INSTALLED

The work of installing the big pump for the irrigation project headed by W. P. Thomas and others has been finished and work has been discontinued until next spring. The pump has been tried out and works very satisfactorily.

The pipe line has also been nearly completed, being now to the railroad track. The work of laying it under the track will be done by the Northwestern Pacific. There remains to lay about 600 feet, the remaining 2100 feet finished.

The pump will deliver into the ditch seven and a half million gallons a day and it is estimated that the flow of the river in the summer time with the water from the Snow Mountain Co's dam turned in will amount to twice this, assuring plenty of water for the project.

The trying out of irrigation in this valley means a big step forward and it will be only a matter of time until every available acre in the valley will be under some system, either private or of the company.

West Lands Good Job

Cecil A. West, who resigned a position on the Press several months ago to accept one as assistant advertising manager on the San Francisco Bulletin, is making good in the city. NEW CASES FILED IN SUPERIOR COURT

Robert Duncan, attorney for the estate, has filed a petition for admission to probate of the will of the late Horace Eldred. Mrs. Amy Eldred will be the executrix. The estate is valued at about \$18,000.

John Taylor through his attorneys Preston and Preston, has asked for letters of administration on the estate of Pierce Asbill. The estate is situated in Covelo and consists of real property of the probable value of \$150.

Thomas and Thomas attorneys for J. M. Luce, have filed a petition for letters of administration on the estate of the late Sophia D. Luce. The husband of the deceased, Geo. Luce, has waived rights. The estate is valued at about \$3500.

Henrietta A. Maloney has filed a suit for divorce from John E. Maloney, alleging intemperance, Preston and Preston appearing as her attorneys. The plaintiff asks for the return of her maiden name of Harriet Alice Hoytx and for the vesting in her of title to certain property alleged to be her own. The parties were married in Contra Costa county in 1910. There are no children.

One complaint alleges that the defendant was injured through the negligence of the defendant corporation while in the latter's employ. The other alleges that after the injury, the agent employed by the company at its hospital to take care of him, through gross neglect, allowed a broken leg to result in blood poisoning and failed to set the bone right, the result being an injury incapacitating the plaintiff from all kind of work.

Some Interesting History

County Clerk McCowen received an old letter this week which recalled some very interesting history of Ukiah in 1876. The letter was one written to H. J. Abbott, who was county clerk in those days, by Judge T. B. Bond. Mr. Abbott was in the Hawaiian islands for his health and Mr. Bond was telling him the news of home. The letter contained reference to the marriage of Wall Hagans and Miss Frances Westbrook and also that of Jack Hart and Miss Laura Haskett. The killing of Bill Granjean at Hopland by Ygarro and the subsequent hanging of the murdered were also touched upon. The letter was dated Jan. 5, 1876. It was given Mr. McCowen by Mr. Abbott's widow.

Mr. McCowen showed the letter to Judge Bond, who recalled it at once and they spent a pleasant half hour reminiscing over old times.

Death of Mrs. Alanson

Mrs. Susan Alanson, sister of Mrs. M. C. Duncan and aunt of Ohas. Duncan, died last night at her sister's home in Ukiah. She had been ill for many months. She was a most estimable woman and during her residence in Ukiah of 6 years has made many friends.
