

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN

To it Ukiah City do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. The Board of Trustees of the Town

every general or special election held in said—
Town, publish in a newspaper published; therein a notice which shall contain the time and

to be filed.

SEC. 2. Such notice shall be published two
times, if published in a weekly newspaper, or
five times if in a daily.

SEC. 3. This ordinance shall take effect after
its publication.
