Midwinter Fair Information. We are informed that quite a number of people throughout the country have the impression that the admission paid at the gate for the Midwinter Pair, does not admit party to all the Fair bulldings, but that a secarate charge is assessed afterward for admission to some of the principle buildings of the Fair, as well as the county buildings.

This is erroneous. The impression seems to have been derived from a article published some weeks ago, giving an estimate of the cost for an individual to visit the side shows on the Fair grounds. The admission at the gate entitles a person to the privileges of all the Fair buildings, and the grounds, except some side-shows, or concessions, as they are called. These are not a part of the bair, but are entertainments, for which the owners nay for the privilege of exhibiting inside the Pair grounds They can be visited or not as a person The Fair'is now in most excellent

shape, and fully worthy of a visit. It is indeed, a pjost magnificent display of the products of California; besides, there is a great number of foreign exhibits, which attracted so much attention at Chicago. The Midwinter Fair has gone beyond the expectation of all. The buildings are splendid specimens of architecture, and the adornment of the grounds is most clahorate. 
