Candlestick Park May Be Ready for World Series

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The San Francisco Giants' new Candlestick Park, seating about 44,000, "definitely" will be ready for use in case the World Series is played here, Mayor George Christopher told United Press International today.

"We won't be able to make a definite statement on when it will be available for league play until the end of the month, or maybe a bit later," said the mayor. "But I can tell you all sections of the park would be ready if the Giants get in the World Series."

With Manager Bill Rigney's crew sailing along in the rough first place course, speculation is rife on what would happen if the Giants had to play a World Series in the 22,000-seat Seals Stadium.
"No need to worry about that," said his honor.

Built On Bay

A survey of the new park, being built by the city of San Francisco on the shores of San Francisco Bay, shows:
—The grandstand and bleachers will be 100 per cent complete.
—The playing field will be ready by Sept. 1.
—The parking lot, to handle more than 9,000 cars will be "just about" ready.
—The lighting towers will be ready by Sept. 1.
—Access roads leading from the stadium to Bayshore freeway will be ready although not perfected.
—The press box will be ready to handle the 600 or more visiting sports writers for a World Series.

Baptists Honor Senior Members

This week end celebrates the 100th anniversary of the founding of the Ukiah First Baptist Church and all members of 25 years standing or longer will be honored with a gift at the 11 a.m. service Sunday.

Among those who will proudly take their place in church Sunday are five Ukiahans whose collective membership totals 321 years: Mrs. Susan Gibson Cleland, 66 years; Mrs. Anna E. McKesson, 67 years; Ed Layman, 66 years; Mrs. Caroline Howard Smith, 61 years; and Miss Rosalie Gibson, 61 years.

Two are daughters of charter members — Mrs. Cleland's father was Tom Gibson and Miss Gibson is a daughter of his brother, Robert Gibson. The Gibson brothers were two of the original six charter members who organized the church here in the schoolhouse on July 25, 1859. Mrs. Cleland herself was on the church board at the time the present church building and parsonage was built.

Mrs. Smith recalls that her grandfather, the Rev. Mark Howard, used to fill in for the resident Baptist minister on many occasions. His great grandson, Cleveland Hopkins, is coming from West Virginia especially to participate in the centennial observance.

Delivering the centennial sermon Sunday will be Dr. Mack McCray, state executive secretary of the Baptist convention from Oakland, and a brother of the Ukiah pastor, Frank McCray. His sermon topic will be "Those Who Have Faith, Therefore."

Special music will be presented by the Sanctuary Choir and Laurie Layman, a son of Ed Layman, will return from his home in Reno, Nev. to sing a solo. Approximately 50 members with 25 years or more membership are expected to be present at the service, the pastor said.

A Centennial Banquet and historical pageant depicting the church's 100 year history in Ukiah will be held tomorrow night with Mrs. Charles Whitaker, Mrs. Lloyd Hamlin and Mrs. Frank McCray in charge.
