TROUT REARING ENTERPRISE AT CLOVERDALE BIG SUCCESS

Club Members Carefully Guard Young German Browns From Enemies

(Santa Rosa Democrat)
The time is fast approaching when many of us, who have proclaimed that the Russian river will become an anglers' paradise, will see the dawn of the new day.

Hundreds of thousands of fish that will live and multiply in the Russian river are now being reared to stock the wonderful stream, so that it will really become a lure for anglers. This has been a dream of years.

Yesterday I talked with several sportsmen from Cloverdale, where the best brown trout rearing pond is located, and the enthusiasm they radiated was infectious.

Cloverdale is the headquarters of the northern Sonoma county fish and game protective association, which yesterday sent out the following statement:
ENTERPRISE SUCCESS
"E. E. McPherson, president of the association, says that the 200,000 German brown trout in the ponds, on the fringe of Russian river, a half-mile east of Cloverdale, are growing nicely and indications point to the success of the enterprise. We have the promise of another consignment of 200,000 brown trout, which will also be placed in these rearing ponds.

"Much praise for the successful rearing of these trout is due to the untiring energy of George E. Brush, who has charge of their care and feeding. Many snakes have been killed when trying to catch the fish. Kingfishers have been shot while trying the same game, and, lately, about 30 'hard mouth' which had succeeded in entering the rearing ponds, were taken out with a seine sent to Brush by Game Warden Dave Dondero, who cares for the wild life of Lake county.

"We are greatly pleased to note that Henry Lencioni, and Harley Groves, game wardens of Sonoma and adjoining counties, have been tireless in their advice and help in making this a successful attempt to rear said fish.

"When these trout are about four to five inches in length, they will be allowed to enter the waters of the Russian river, and here is where all the sportsmen of the state are interested. The fish are theirs, if they can catch them.

"So far the mortality is slight and we feel that we are justified in saying that we will make a success of rearing young trout in the river near Cloverdale.

"Everyone is invited to come to Cloverdale rearing ponds and watch these brown beauties grow and fight for their share of the food put out daily for them. Their principal food is ground beef hearts and you would enjoy seeing them hurdle for their food.

"The association is composed of more than 300 members, whose dues are \$2.00 each. This association under the leadership of McPherson, has done much for the preservation of wild game of every kind and much praise is due him.

"Anyone inclined to violate the game laws in or about the northern end of Sonoma county should remember that over 300 regular sportsmen are watching for infractions of the state game laws and should not be surprised if they are interviewed by one of the above game wardens.

"Be a good sport and when you come to this vicinity with your gun or rod you will find a good quantity of game in waiting. Help us protect the wild life."

CAR SMASHES WAY INTO RESTAURANT AT WILLITS

The car made a lunge forward, entered the front door and took it and a row of tables before it and piled them all up against the partition to the kitchen. Broken glass, china-ware, catsup and sugar were scattered all over the floor.

Several people were eating but they all happened to be at the side tables except Tom McNameer, who occupied one of the rear tables. Tom was nearly scared to death and his friends are saying some unkind things about him. The waitress, Mrs. Lilly Peterson, also had a close call but managed to duck between two side tables.

In a few minutes a large crowd collected and the car was pushed back into the street. It was not damaged—not even scratched. Carpenters were put to work at once repairing the front of the building and by night it was ready for the painter. The city couple then paid for all of the damages and went on their way rejoicing.

MRS. MARY McPEAK DIES SUDDENLY AT STA. ROSA

Pioneer Woman of Willits Answers Last Call While on Visit to Sonoma Relative

WILLITS, Sept. 9.—Mrs. Mary McPeak died very suddenly at Santa Rosa Tuesday morning, September 6. She left here last Friday for a visit with her sister and appeared to be in good health.

Mary Norris was born in Sonoma county, April 16, 1852. She married Eugene McPeak 57 years ago and about 40 years ago they moved to this valley and purchased what is now known as the Walnut Grove ranch, three miles southeast of Willits, on which the dam of the Willits water system is now located.

They sold the ranch about 15 years ago and moved to town. In 1920 they celebrated their golden wedding and the Masons and O. E. S. gave them a great party and reception in honor of the event at the hall.

Three years ago Mr. McPeak died and she has been failing steadily ever since for they were a most devoted couple.

The remains were brought here for burial and the funeral was held at the Methodist church yesterday afternoon, Rev. A. H. McKellup officiating. The deceased was a charter member of Willits Chapter, O. E. S., and also of the Rebekahs, and both lodges attended the sad ceremonies in a body.

POINT ARENA TO HOLD A DAIRYMEN'S PICNIC

Plans are being contemplated by the Point Arena farm center for the second annual dairymen's picnic and Jersey stock show to be held in Stornetta's grove at Manchester on Saturday, September 17.



ASSISTING INVESTIGATION OF FIRE ON AUGUST 13

"Buddy" Haswell is in town this week looking after the insurance interests of Mrs. Ida Lindstrom and Berkeley Haswell whose property was destroyed in the fire which consumed the home of Mrs. Pearl Sturtevant, Saturday evening, August 13. Representatives from the Board of Fire Underwriters have gone over the field this week with Buddy Haswell. Charred remnants of articles at first reported missing from the home have been found.

Firemen who responded to the call when the Sturtevant home was destroyed are confident that the fire was of incendiary origin. Ukiah has had several fires within the past few weeks the origin of which has not been determined. The Board of Fire Underwriters, it is understood, will keep a man on the job, until the cause of the fires is found or a report made that such causes cannot be located.

Mrs. Ida Lindstrom and Berkeley Haswell were insured to the amount of \$2500 with the Fidelity Phoenix Insurance Company. The payment of this amount has been withheld pending an investigation. Berkeley Haswell and Buddy Haswell left Ukiah in the spring. They are at present located at Hollywood. Mrs. Ida Lindstrom spent the summer in Lake county. As soon as the matter of insurance is settled Mrs. Lindstrom will go to Los Angeles to make her home with the Haswells.
