## Wildcat Squad Rounding Into Shape, First String Lineup, Reserves Fairly Well Set

Conditioned by two weeks of practice, the Ukiah High school Wildcats football squad is now shaping as a unit which Coach Roger Wren believes will develop into a fairly powerful outfit.

The squad has been pretty well screened for first stringers for offense and defense, first string replacements and potentials.

With the exception of a couple of line positions the starting lineup is fairly well established, although Wren made it clear that before the season is too old two or three boys, who now lack experience, will be giving some of the present first stringers competition.

Wren said he was looking forward to the opening game in Ukiah against Fortuna Sept. 17. By that time Fortuna will have played Ashland, Ore.

Tomorrow evening the Wildcats will scrimmage for two quarters against the Willits High school team. This will be a part of a Northwestern League officials clinic, which will be under the direction of George Weeks, league commissioner and principal coach of the Willits High school, Lake county.

Starting at 8 p.m., the attending coaches and officials will review rule changes and at 8:30 Ukiah and Willits squads will scrimmage. Anderson Valley and an unnamed team will scrimmage at 9:30. This will be followed by assignment of officials from a list compiled that evening. Assignments will be for both eleven and six-man football games.

Ukiah High school coaches will take part, although the Wildcats are not a member of the Northwestern League, in that they will play an independent schedule.

When this week was enthusiastic over the practice performances of Manuel Perry, who will be the starting quarterback and play caller from T pivot spot. Greatly improved over last year, his passing has sharpened and his faking on handoffs has been very effective.

Behind Perry is Jim Hamilton, up from the junior varsity, who will be the first string substitute in the spot. Although Hamilton is a little light, he is an excellent play caller and is an accurate short passer.

Replacing Don Carson, who has failed to report for the squad, is Joe Bishop, who will be used as first string offensive and defensive right half and safety man. This year he has developed into a speedy runner and passer and undoubtedly will see plenty of action.

Vying with Bishop for the right half back position are Channing Cornell and Don Colombini. Both are hard runners and aggressive defensive men.

Lee Gorman is the leading candidate for the full back spot. He has looked exceptionally good in practice and is expected to develop into a powerful line smasher. So far he appears to be the best blocker on the squad.

When is looking to Charles Hale as a reliever for Gorman. Hale is shifty and could add to the effectiveness of the T formation of defense.

Hale and Bishop will do the punting for the squad.

Jim Hardman, back for the fourth year, will start at left half. He is fast and rugged and was a leading ground gainer last year. Backing up Hardman will be Roger Smith, a likely looking prospect with plenty of speed and a deceptive change of pace. He will see plenty of action of defense, but

may push Hardman as an offensive man.

Dave Irmer, co-captain, is a sticky-fingered pass receiver, who moves fast and is a good blocker. On the other end of the line will be Fred Rose. Competing for end positions are Jim Brown, Tom Whittaker, Carl Middleton, who has been ill, is expected to be a contender for an end position when he does report.

At center will be Ronald Ford, backed up by Walter Wong, up from the junior varsity squad and switched from fullback, and Gary Bondy.

Three juniors are battling it out for tackle positions. Max Wilson, tips the scales at 183 pounds, Ronald Hunter at 200, and Dave Wright at 202. However, Frank Rhoades, co-captain, has the inside track for the right tackle slot.

Kevin Cole will start at left guard, with his substitute and the right tackle starter to be picked from Howard Cornell, Cecil Baran, Pete Kelley, Herschel Love, Steve Clark, Wayne Foster, a leading candidate, has been sidelined by a case of boils.

## City Playground Summer Plans Termed Success

Ukiah's organized playground program, which completed a nine-week period recently, was evaluated as a successful experiment by City Recreation Director Joe Juliana. The program, designed to serve three different age groups during three, three-week periods, drew a grand total of 847 recorded attendances from June 28 to Aug. 27, attracting 168 children to a wide variety of planned activities and special events.

Miss Dorothy Keene, supervisor, provided activities designed for each separate age group, including crafts, story hour, games, sports, free play periods, swimming and the following special events: Hikes, tours, and a trip to the fairgrounds.

A three week program was organized for each of the following age groups: 6 and 7, 8 and 10, and 10, 11 and 12, with a prescribed set of activities that would be attractive to each group, and a wide variation of additional special events that filled out the program. The younger group showed the most interest in creative crafts, finger painting and use of the new playground equipment. The middle age group had a particular interest in crafts, the playground equipment and some of the individual sports. The larger group displayed a more flexible interest in the less formal program, but especially the trips and hikes and advanced crafts and team sports.

Juliana stated, "It is likely that short term periods will be planned for the tiny tots program next year, possibly half-day sessions." But all factors being equal, the director expressed complete satisfaction with the leadership, the program as planned, and the interest and enthusiasm as displayed by the children.
