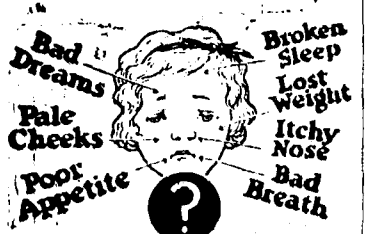
## Ukiah People To Visit In Southern California
