

U. S. TOUR OF WINDSOR CANCELLED

Official Announcement Follows Action of Labor

PARIS, France, Nov. 5. (UP)—The Duke of Windsor, it was officially announced tonight, has decided to postpone his tour of the United States.

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 5. (UP)—The Duke of Windsor was "extremely angry" at American labor today and prepared to defy criticism, a source close to royal entourage said.

He was quoted as calling American labor resolutions as "not cricket," taking the view that they were hitting Charles Beddau, his American tour representative, thru the Duke.

A reliable source said that the Duke had been seriously considering cancellation of the trip, but eventually decided to defy the attacks in order to back up Beddau.

It was likely the visit would incline more toward the social side and that the Duke could cut out much of the part he intended to devote to investigating conditions as part of his campaign to better the working men's condition.

LAYTONVILLE REALIGNMENT WORK COMPLETE

Construction Started On \$59,000 Bridge On Garcia

Realignment of the Redwood highway near Laytonville in northern Mendocino county was completed this week, according to the national re-employment service's progress report on highway work throughout the northbay area.

The work has been under way for the past eight months as a bureau of public roads project, with Hemstreet and Bell as the contractors. Highway construction equipment is now being moved from the scene of the realignment. Construction of a new \$59,000 bridge has started across the Garcia river on the coast highway out of Point Arena, with Peter McHugh as the contractor.

Other coast highway work in the vicinity of Point Arena will be completed soon, and resurfacing work at Yorkville is progressing rapidly. Harold Smith is contractor for the latter job.

Bids will be opened November 10 for construction of two more new bridges in the Mendocino county coast area, one over Elk creek near Elk and the other over Jughandle creek south of Fort Bragg.

Workers for all of the projects have been provided through the branch NRS offices in Mendocino county, according to Roger Thomas, district manager of the employment service.

Estate of Man Dead 30 Years, Now in Probate

A petition to assign the estate of George Heldt, who passed away in January, 1907, to his widow, Annie Heldt, is now in the probate court.

The estate involves property on the Mendocino coast. When George Heldt died he was survived by his widow and three children, Theodore, Garce and George. In the 30 years that have intervened two of the children, Theodore and Garce have passed away, according to the petition, and George Heldt has not been heard from for 20 years.

OAKLAND, Calif., Nov. 5. (UP)—The H. C. Capwell Co. department store, one of the largest in the west, remained open for business today despite a clerks strike which entered the second day with no indication of immediate conciliation of union demands for a "closed shop."

The management announced it will keep doors open as long as possible. The retail merchants' association reiterated its warning it will shut down 43 additional Oakland and Berkeley stores if the Capwell company is forced to halt business.

Appointment of Warden Hinges on Ryan's Health

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5. (UP)—Appointment of a new warden for Folsom prison hinged today on the physical condition of William Ryan, hero of the recently attempted Folsom break in which he was badly wounded. In the event Ryan is declared by doctors to be fully recovered, he was expected to be appointed tomorrow at a meeting of the state board of prison directors.

In event doctors rule Ryan's condition is not yet, the appointment will go temporarily to Clyde Plummet, veteran Los Angeles police officer, who will hold the post until Ryan recovers.

That was the status today as a result of the stand announced by A. R. O'Brien of Ukiah, prison board director who controls the appointment, because two of the directors are for Plummer and the other two favor Ryan, leaving to O'Brien the deciding vote.

"The whole question rested and rests on Captain Ryan's return to health," O'Brien said. "I am not voting for any permanent warden at Folsom except Captain Ryan," he stated.

Directors of Hop Growers Take Action

State Board Approves Plan for Control Of Crops

California's participation in a proposed tri-state association for cooperative control of hop marketing was recommended at a conference of the board of directors of the United Hop Growers of California, held this week in Santa Rosa.

After hearing reports that Oregon hop growers had overwhelmingly approved the new cooperative proposal, the board added its endorsements and went on record urging an immediate sign-up campaign in this state.

Already 85 per cent of Oregon's hop tonnage has been signed up for participation in such a tri-state cooperative, it was claimed at the meeting. A delegation of leading Oregon growers plan going into Washington this week end to seek support of the third hop producing state proposed for inclusion in the new marketing program.

By-laws for the proposed new cooperative have already been drafted by attorneys for the California farm bureau federations, and articles of incorporation prepared.

As now proposed, such a cooperative would allow growers to handle selling of their hops without having to deal through brokers.

M. J. Newhouse of Oakland, manager of the Pacific coast hop stabilization corporation, met with the growers to explain progress of the pool for ridding the market of holdover hops.

Over 80,000 bales of old hops have been signed up for diversion under the program, Newhouse declared, and the diversion sales are expected to start within 30 days. As a result of federal aid, the growers will be able to net approximately \$7 per bale for the surplus hops that are diverted into by-products.

I. D. Wood, president of the state association of growers, presided over the meeting, which was attended by directors from the Sacramento valley, Mendocino county and Sonoma county.

Giant Octopus Attacks Woman At Hare Creek

Mrs. H. C. Graves of Noyo was attacked by a giant devil-fish while gathering abalones near Hare creek Wednesday. She felt something rubbing against her ankle and thought at first it was a piece of loose seaweed; soon she realized that she was securely fastened to the spot by a tentacle that had been wrapped around her ankle with several turns. Another tentacle pinioned her left arm to her side as it passed around her waist. She screamed for help, all the while endeavoring to land a telling blow with her abalone bar.

Three ladies who were with her, but some distance away at the time, came to her aid and after great effort managed to free Mrs. Graves, and with their combined efforts the octopus was dislodged and killed. Two smaller ones were also taken from the same cavern.

The large devil-fish measured 10 feet 6 inches from tip to tip of the longest tentacles, thus making an average of more than five feet from the center of its body to the end of each arm.

It is said to be of record size, and Mrs. Graves counts herself most fortunate, although her body is badly bruised in a number of places.

Nine grandchildren and five great grandchildren are also left to mourn his passing. Mrs. Legg preceded her husband in death two years ago.

HITLER MAY BE MEDIATOR, CHINA JAPANESE WAR

Procedure Depends on Italy's Attitude In Matter

BERLIN, Ger., Nov. 5. (UP)—Fuehrer Adolf Hitler may offer to mediate between Japan and China, reliable quarters said today, but must be sure first of Italy's support in a united German-Italian front.

It was understood German procedure depended considerably on Italy's attitude, which is being discussed by Joachim von Ribbentrop, Hitler's envoy who is now in Rome to obtain Italy's entry into the anti-communist agreement of Germany and Japan.

It was generally expected, therefore, that any mediation offer or any announcement will not be issued before tomorrow or early next week after von Ribbentrop returns and reports to Hitler.

SHANGHAI, Nov. 5. (UP)—Japan is landing a new army on the coast southwest of Shanghai in an effort to drive the Chinese from their stations on the fortified Pootung area of the city, across the Whangpoo river from the International Settlement, it was announced today.

Advance units of this new army were there now, it was said, and others were ready to disembark from transports.

Ousting of the Chinese from Pootung and the expected isolation of Chinese troops of Shanghai on the other side of the river, would leave the Japs dominant throughout the Shanghai section.

Danger to foreigners and refugees is lessened since the Sino-Japanese agreement signed guaranteeing the Nantao section, between the French concession, and the Whangpoo, as a neutral zone.

PEIPING, China, Nov. 5. (UP)—The Domei news agency reports that Japanese forces reached the main gate of Taiyuan, capital of the rich mining province of Shansi, today. The Japanese, a communique, were closing in from all sides.

BURGLAR SHOT, BULLET STRIKES S. F. BYSTANDER

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Nov. 5. (UP)—Two men, one a suspected burglar and the other a bystander, were shot and seriously wounded today by a police inspector in a downtown business district.

James Lane, 19, was shot through the back and chest by Inspector James English, after a wild chase through mid-day crowds in the city's business area.

A passerby, Joseph Francis, Fairbanks hotel employee, was struck by a bullet which ricocheted off the side of a building during the chase.
