Roy Simpson, state superintendent of public instruction, will be the main speaker, choosing as his topic, "The Importance of the Teacher in a Democracy," at the dinner given Tuesday, May 13, the first night of the 2-day meeting. He will discuss the present status of teachers in the state and also some of the legislation regarding education which is now pending in the legislature.
