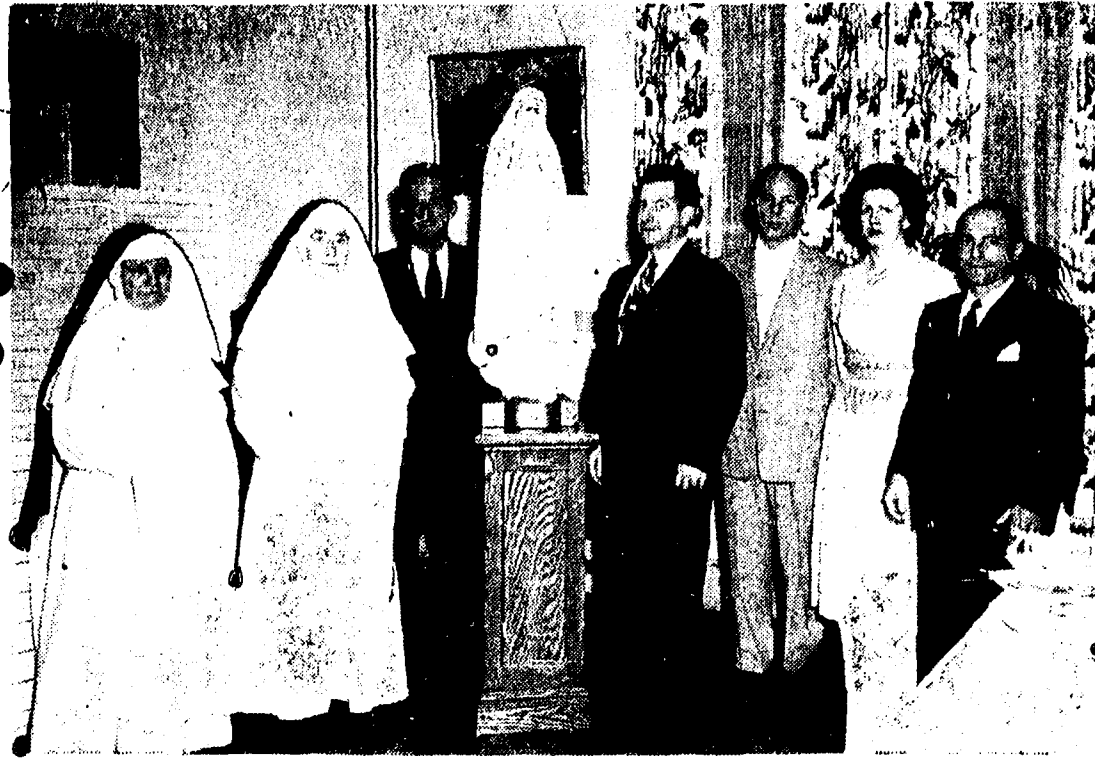


## New Statue Gift to Albertinum

## Y.M.I.-Y.L.I. Bodies Present Gift To Albertinum at Sunday Ceremony

Serving as a memorial to deceased members of units within the Redwood Empire District of Young Men's Institute and Young Women's Institute, the fine statue of "Our Lady of Fatima" was presented with special ceremonies to the Albertinum, parochial school here, on Sunday afternoon.

A caravan of cars brought some fifty members of the two organizations from units representing San Rafael, Petaluma, Healdsburg, Santa Rosa, and other points to join with the Catholic bodies here for a luncheon at 12:30 at El Rosario, residence hall of girl students at the school. Presentation of the beautiful art piece at the luncheon was made by John Lombbos, and acceptance was made by Sister M. Fedelis, prioress at the girls' hall.

The blessing and dedication of the statue followed in the pretty chapel in the Albertinum school buildings, with the Rev. Fr. Celestine Quinlan, O.F.M., Cap., presiding.

The statue, particularly attractive in its execution, pays honor to the apparition of the Holy Mother Mary in Fatima, Portugal, to three peasant children, in 1917, making its choice a fitting one for inclusion in the school children's collection of religious objects.

Francis Gibson, president of the Ukiah Y.M.I., directed local arrangements for the caravan luncheon and presentation here, at which Arthur J. Quinn of San Rafael, retiring district Y.M.I. chairman collaborated with John Lombbos, Vincent Schoenigh, Loretta O'Rourke and Roy Carbone, all visitor representatives here for the day.

## Kiwanis Sponsor Kids' Day Here

Ukiah today joined the parade of cities across the continent that will observe National Kid's Day on Saturday, September 23.

Sponsored locally by the Kiwanis Club, the National Kid's Day celebration is designed to focus public attention on the needs of underprivileged children and to raise funds with which to meet these needs. More than 3,150 Kiwanis Clubs throughout the United States, Canada, Alaska and Hawaii are planning local celebrations and activities for Kid's Day.

"Plans for local observance of this second annual Kid's Day are rapidly nearing completion," Rod Zimmerman, president of the Ukiah Kiwanis Club announced today. "These plans which will be announced in detail later this week, are aimed at actually trying to do something about the needs of underprivileged youth here in our own community."

The Kiwanis Club is cooperating with the National Kid's Day Foundation, a non-profit corporation which was organized to stimulate a general awareness of youth problems, Zimmerman said.

Unlike many special days on the calendar, National Kid's Day is not a commercial device, it was pointed out, and the only ones who will profit from it are underprivileged children. Funds raised through activities in connection with National Kid's Day in Ukiah will be spent to benefit underprivileged children in this community.

MENDOCINO, Sept. 7 — The church by the sea, the historic Mendocino Presbyterian church, was the setting for a beautiful wedding ceremony on Saturday afternoon, September 2, when Gloria Strauss and Clarence Atkinson repeated the sacred vows which made them man and wife.

The lovely old church was beautifully decorated for the occasion by friends who had known the bride since babyhood.

A latticed trellis, from which was suspended a wedding bell, had been placed before the altar. The trellis was entwined with huckleberry foliage and white rosebuds. At either side of the trellis were tall baskets containing white gladioli, white stock and ferns.

The same decoration was on each window setting.

Music for the wedding was played by Miss Sandra Paul at the organ. Just preceding the ceremony Miss Jeanette Fraser sang "Because."

Before the strains of the wedding march were heard, Rev. J. M. Kooyers and the groom, with his attendants, entered from a rear door and took their places. Clarence Atkinson was attended by his best man, Russell Enochs, and Donald Gibbons.

Three bridesmaids and a matron of honor preceded the bride, escorted by her father, who gave her in marriage to the young man of her choice.

The bridesmaids were attired in organdy frocks, made identically the same, ballerina length, with close fitting bodices and off-the-shoulder neckline. The dresses were in different pastel shades, with caps of the same material.

Each bridesmaid carried an old fashioned nosegay in a contrasting shade.

Entering first were Lila Mendosa, in an orchid frock and carrying yellow flowers; Flora Gordon in blue, carrying pink flowers; Maxine Herreras in a yellow frock with orchids. Last came the matron of honor, Elizabeth Enochs in green carrying a nosegay centered with a single orchid.

The bride, a beautiful girl, made a picture of exquisite loveliness in her wedding gown of ivory satin. Youthful in style, it had a close fitting bodice, buttoned down the back with tiny satin buttons. The transparent yoke, with a high neckline, was outlined with a border of satin. Short puffed sleeves with long satin gauntlets enhanced the bodice, from which the very full skirt and train fell over a hooped foundation. Vertical shirrings across the front displayed dainty little ruffles. A dainty cap and finger veil completed the costume.

The bride's bouquet was a sprig of white bouvardia, centered with an orchid.

Following the marriage service, the ushers, John Strauss and Carl Atkinson, joined the bridal group as they left the church to the strains of the recessional.

A reception was held at the Strauss home immediately following the service and was attended by relatives and the many intimate friends who had been invited to witness the ceremony.

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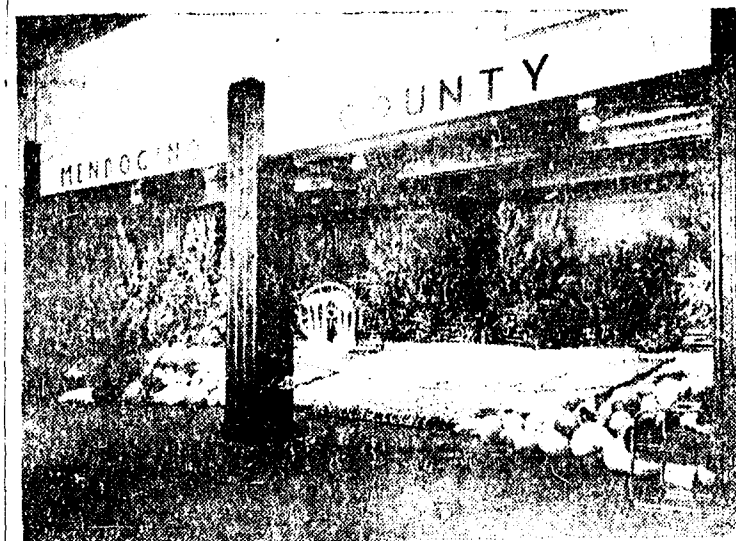
