

# BLOW TO BATH

Lackawanna Railroad Celting Even for Increased Assessment.

TAKES EFFECT

Train Crows to Change at Elmira In stead of Bath-Families Will Move Away From the Latter Village Causing Loss-Steuben.

A new rule has been put in operation on the Lackawanna by which the two fast rains, known as Nus. 3 and the change engines at Elmira instead of Bath, as formerly. The run is made from Buffalo to Elmira with one engine, and it is said that similar change may be made in the opertion of other trains now changing at Bath. This will be a serious blow to the village, as it will probably necessitate the emoval of the several crews and their families to Elmira.
