Johnson to Address Rotary Tuesday on Delinquent Child

Program chairman Bob Chandler announces that the speaker for tomorrow's meeting of Rotary will be: Lester Johnson, currently a teacher in the public schools of Geyserville.

For several years Johnson was a teacher in the Preston School Of Industry (an institution for delinquent boys). He will tell of his experiences in dealing with the delinquent child, and of how he discovered the use of music as an approach to mutual understanding and rehabilitation therapy.

Johnson will explain to the group what the school is doing to bring out the best in each child, and will tell of the "jam sessions," band, and television appearances which he helped promote as his contribution to the rehabilitation program.

The speaker for last Tuesday's meeting, as arranged for by program chairman Fran Burns, was Rev. P. M. Stewart, rector of the Holy Trinity Episcopal Church of Ukiah.

Rev. Stewart revealed for the assembled Rotarians a Rotary International publication entitled "Seven Paths to Peace." In these unsettled times, when war with Russia seems eventually inevitable, there is one approach which might help to avoid an all-out war
