BELL ENDORSES THE SANFORD LAND BILL

"I desire to enumerate briefly a few things that will affect farming life in California. First of course, is the tenure or title by which lands are held; unless men feel absolutely secure in their land titles, there is not the incentive to make the best use of the land and to erect permanent mprovements. A man's rights to o own land ought to be coupled with resent or prospective citizenship. No man should be permitted to claim ne acre of our soil in fee simple abvorce from Nancy M. 
