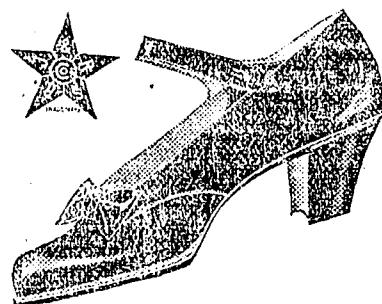

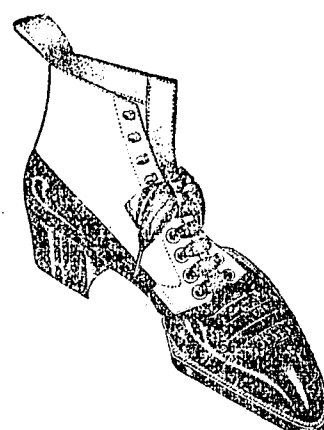

Notice Inviting Street Work Proposals

Series 1911, No. 9

Pursuant to the "Improvement Act of 1911" and to a resolution (series 1911, No. 9) Adopted August 23, 1911 by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Ukiah City, County of Mendocino, State of California, ordering the work and directing this notice, the undersigned invites and will receive at his office in the City Hall on the southeast corner of School and Church streets in said Town up to 7:30 P. M. on Wednesday, September 6, 1911, sealed proposals or bids for doing the following work in accordance with plans and specifications therefor adopted July 31, 1911, posted and on file, to-wit:

That a reinforced concrete culvert be constructed from the North line of Perkins street across Perkins street and across a right of way owned by said Town to the east line of property owned by Mrs. M. A. Held, along the course of Gibson Creek and for the purpose of conveying the waters of Gibson Creek; all in accordance with plans and specifications therefor, adopted by said Board of Trustees of said Town July 31, 1911, and now on file in the office of the Clerk of said Town and in the office of the City Engineer of said Town;

The said Board of Trustees has determined and declared that the expense of such work or improvement shall be chargeable upon a district lying and being in said Town and bounded and described as follows to-wit: Commencing at the intersection of the East line of Oak street and the center line of Gibson creek; thence down the center line of Gibson Creek to its intersection with the south line of Perkins street, thence easterly along the south line of Perkins street to its intersection with the easterly line of the lands of the Northwestern Pacific Railway Company, thence Southerly along said easterly line to a point which would be the intersection of the northerly line of Clay street if extended easterly, thence westerly to and along the northerly boundary line of Clay street to the easterly line of Oak street, thence northerly along the easterly line of Oak street to the point of beginning.

Notice Inviting Street Work Proposals

Series 1911, No. 8

Pursuant to the "Improvement Act of 1911" and to a resolution (series 1911, No. 8) adopted August 23, 1911, by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Ukiah City, County of Mendocino, State of California, ordering the work and directing this notice, the under-

signed invites and will receive at his office in the City Hall on the southeast corner of School and Church streets in said Town up to 7:30 P. M. on Wednesday, September 6, 1911, sealed proposals or bids for doing the following work in accordance with plans and specifications therefor adopted July 31, 1911, posted and on file, to-wit:

That the roadway of each of the following designated portions of streets in said Town be graded to the official grade, to-wit, HENRY STREET from the west line of State street to the east line of School street, SMITH STREET from the west line of Main street to the east line of Oak street (including all intervening intersections except that of State street); STANLEY STREET from the west line of Main street to the east line of State street, SCHOOL STREET from the north line of Stanley street to the south line of Smith street, SCHOOL STREET from the south line of Church street to the south line of Perkins street; that concrete curbs be constructed along both lines of each of said roadways (except where concrete or stone curbs are already done to the official grade); that concrete gutters be constructed along both lines of each of said roadways (except where concrete gutters are already done to the official grade); that each of said roadways between said gutters be paved with an asphalt pavement, consisting of an asphaltic concrete base 3 1/2 inches thick and an asphalt wearing surface 1 inch thick; that a concrete bridge be constructed across the gutters at each corner formed in said roadways by terminating or intersecting roadways; that a culvert with a concrete base and a Corrugated American Ingot Iron Top be constructed at each of the following designated places in said roadways, to-wit, across Smith street at the east curb line of School street, across Smith street at the west curb line of School street, across Church street at the east curb line of School street, across Church street at the west curb line of School street; all of said work to be done in accordance with plans and specifications therefor, adopted by said Board of Trustees July 31, 1911, and now on file in the office of the clerk of said Town and in the office of the City Engineer of said Town;

The said Board of Trustees has determined and declared that serial bonds bearing interest at the rate of seven per cent per annum and extending over a period of nine years from the second day of January next succeeding their date, shall be issued in the manner and form provided in the "Improvement Act of 1911" to represent assessments of twenty-five dollars or over, for the cost of said street work.
