Messrs. Hugh Harvey and Fred Falkenberg, Rev. Davies and Dr. Robberd Thomas. Among the songs by Dr. Thomas was one entitled "The Beautiful Eastern Star," the words of which were written by the late Mrs. Helen Carpenter, a former member of the chapter and the music was composed by Mrs. Leta Wadsworth, at one time a resident and a music teacher of this city.

This song was the accompaniment to a most inspiring past-installation ceremony in which a five-pointed floral star, each point being in one of the five emblematic colors of the order and having dependent therefrom long loops of satin ribbon in appropriate color, was placed upon the altar. The officers representing the five points of the central star of the order, with slow-moving, measured step, in unison with the music, then approached the altar and taking hold of the knotted end of each loop of ribbon, raised it aloft and brought the ends together directly over the floral star, the whole constituting a very significant and effective tribute and directing attention to the great central principle and foundation stone of the order, "The Beautiful Eastern Star."

Short talks were made by the retiring and incoming matrons and patrons, Mrs. F. S. Dorman of Willits chapter, J. L. Annette of Lakeport chapter, and Mrs. Fannie T. McCowen. In Memory

After an illness of many months the life here of Bonaparte Cleveland came to an end at his home near Upper Lake, Wednesday. He will be long remembered by a host of friends and relatives in this county and in Lake county.

Mr. Cleveland was the eldest son of the late Martin Van and Ann Howard Cleveland and grandson of M. W. Howard and Rachel Howard, early pioneers of Ukiah. He was born in Butte county but was brought by his parents to their new home here when an infant and grew to manhood in Ukiah. When only a boy he carried mail over the snows of San Hedrin into Round valley and has been loved and remembered there for his intrepid worth.

He lived for some years after marriage at Ukiah where he had charge of our electric light system, later going to Lake county where his life closed.

Earnestness and simplicity with a firm belief in God were his virtues and the sturdy character of pioneers his heritage. Friends were many especially among children.

His daughter, Mrs. Hazel Polk, and his wife, of Upper Lake, with one brother, James Cleveland of Ukiah, and his sisters, Mrs. Emma Davis of San Rafael, Mrs. Eugene Gannon of Santa Rosa, Mrs. Flora Rowland of Seattle, Mrs. May Oldham of Santa Rosa and Mrs. Lucia Hopkins of Ukiah, are left of his family with many other relatives who deeply mourn his departure.

The funeral was held at Upper Lake yesterday afternoon.

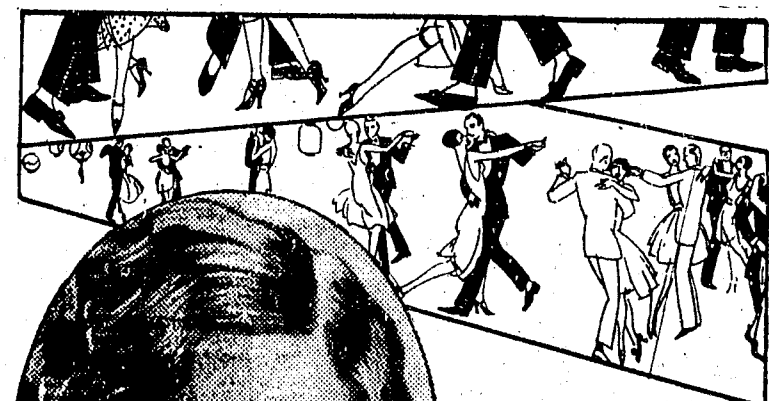
