Anyone failing to receive a ballot in the mail, may obtain one from the ASC county office.

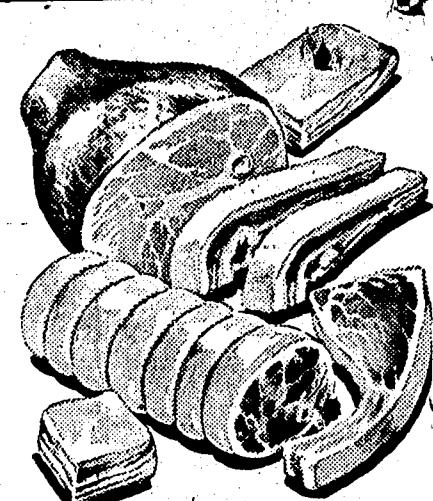
The names appearing on the ballots, have been selected by the community nominating committee, however, names may be written in.
