## LAKEPORT RAILROAD WORK PROGRESSING

The proceedings at the meeting of the stockholders of the Clear Lake Railroad Company held at the court house last Thursday afternoon have given the project a far more favorable aspect to the mind of the average stockholder than it has yet held.

Already the director have taken steps to communicate with several railroad builders, and there are contractors who stand ready to bid on the work as soon as they have been furnished with the necessary data by Engineer Rankin. The time intervening before this will be done is now but a matter of days. Mr. Rankin has made the statement that the location survey will be completed to Lakeport by the latter part of next week. As soon thereafter as he is able to compile data for the contractors it will be submitted to them for estimates and they will furnish bids for the consideration of the directors. It is probable that the formality of advertising for bids will have to be gone through with, but much time will probably be saved by previous communication with contractors.

It is probable that most of the grading on the Lake county side of the summit will be done by local contractors, as there will be very little heavy or difficult work, requiring expert knowledge of railroad construction. The work on the Hopland side will be more difficult as considerable rock and heavy grading will be encountered.

Engineer Rankin is authority for the statement that should grading be commenced this fall, and the work pushed forward with all possible dispatch trains should be running into Lakeport in time to accommodate the tourist traffic next season.

No difficulty is anticipated by the directors in raising the balance necessary to build the road. Many of the stockholders stand ready to double their subscriptions as soon as the dirt begins to move, and the directors have had assurance from capitalists in San Francisco that when money is needed it will be forthcoming. The Northwestern Pacific has never specified any amount to be raised before it takes the \$80,000 worth of bonds for which it has agreed to furnish track material. The subscribers are paying up well on the second installment of their subscriptions, and nearly \$10,000 has already been paid into the treasury.

The right of way committee, consisting of H. V. Keeling, L. H. Boggs and S. E. Brookes is busy interviewing property owners and obtaining rights of way. The results of the committee's work have thus far been very satisfactory.—Bee.

## WHY NOT BUY FROM LOCAL MERCHANTS

Dont' get imbued with the idea that "outside bargains" save you money? As a matter of fact a sociological study of the question proves that it does not. Should you take a catalogue and pick out a bill of goods, send for them, and finally view the goods and examine the quality after you get them, there's invariably a little demon that sits on your shoulder and whispers, "You're Stung." Mail order goods are usually unsatisfactory and cheap prices only represent cheap goods.

Beyond the mere damage of getting stung, there still remains the fact that the money that bought the goods is a great distance from home.

Retailers have a certain selling price scale and variations from that scale makes little difference to the purchaser. Hence the same goods you receive could be bought for the same price plus the cost of transportation, providing the local merchant kept that cheap line of goods. Should the money have been spent at home the profit on the goods would have gone to the local people and you would again be benefited by the circulation of the money.

Keep the money at home by trading at home and you will find that the bills are not so hard to collect, people will have money and times will be easier.

### PAPERS JOIN SUFFRAGE RANKS

A great number of the influential papers of California have joined the ranks and are boosting in the equal suffrage campaign. On August 6th the San Francisco Call, by a forceful full page editorial, started an avalanche of editorial declarations throughout the state. The Los Angeles Herald on the following Sunday devoted the same amount of space to the same theme in quite as unflinching a manner. Next came the Ventura Free Press, the Santa Barbara Independent, the Bulletin and the Star from San Francisco, the Express, Tribune, Examiner and the Record of Los Angeles, the Sun of San Bernardino, the Redlands Facts, the Riverside Enterprise and Press and any other papers that are lending their influence in the struggle for enfranchisement.

### AUTOMOBILE SPACE FILLED

The scarcity of room for the automobile and motor-truck exhibits at the State Fair emphasises the need for a special building for the vehicle exhibits. All the space under the big new grand stand is taken up and a number of entries have been turned down for the lack of space. But for this difficulty the automobile show at the State Fair this year would have greatly exceeded any previous auto show anywhere on the coast. However, by a careful distribution of space there will be a good variety and altogether a very handsome exhibit. Nine gold medals are offered in this class and there is plenty of competition.

On last Friday morning, August 18th, the wife of Rev. Orin Whitcomb passed away at her home in Calistoga. The remains were laid to rest the following Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock.
