COUNTY FAIR FOR COAST THIS YEAR

The County Fair Committee on organization met at the City Hall last Friday night, Jan. 31, and appointed an Executive Committee consisting of the following named citizens: J E Weller, W G Jones, Chas Dahl, C W Mathews, H W Little, W W Ware and J A Nelson.

The Executive Committee held their first meeting last Tuesday evening in the City Hall and elected the following officers: Chairman, J E Weller; Vice Chairman, W W Ware; Secretary, Jas Whipple; Treasurer, C W Mathews. After the election of officers the members started right out with their appointment of members to various committees upon whom will depend much of the preliminary work in making the fair a perfect success. W W Ware was placed on the Finance Committee; C R Ware will have charge of the Entertainment Committee; H W Little, of Sports and Amusements; Publicity and Printing, J A Nelson.

H F Milliken was elected ex-officio member of all committees and will have general supervision of the fair. The Board of Town Trustees was appointed as the Committee on Grounds. Adjournment was then taken to meet at call of the chairman.

The question of finance being the most important thing for immediate attention hastened the action of C R Ware in outlining plans for a series of entertainments to begin February 22nd, and every Saturday night thereafter. The idea is to have the entertainments and shows staged at the local theatres, if arrangements can be made. These entertainments should be well patronized for the proceeds will all go to the Fair fund. There is a large sum of money to be raised to meet expenses for the coming fair and all contributors both large and small is aiding in a grand boost for the Mendocino coast and the county in general.

He was born on October 14th 1876 at Santa Maria and spent his boyhood and youth there. He married Mrs. Rachel Howard Orr, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. H. Howard of this city on October 7th, 1907. He was in failing health for the last three years and moved successively to Ukiah, San Diego and Santa Barbara in the hope that the beneficial climates would restore him. He joined the Baptist church in May 1908.

The funeral was conducted in Santa Maria on the 6th inst by the local body of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows of which he had been a member for many years and he was followed to his last resting place by many sorrowing relatives and friends.

Mr. Marcum was well known as a man of most exemplary character and of unswerving and unselfish devotion to his family. His character, worth and faith were most feelingly dwelt upon by the Rev. Spring Grove district was denied on the ground that the board had insufficient information on which to form the district.

The purchasing agent was authorized to get estimates on the removing of a wall in the auditor's office.

A petition was filed with the board asking for the construction of a wagon road up Robinson creek, and the same was approved, and the following viewers appointed to view out and map said road: R E Donohoe surveyor, Pink Burke and Thomas Farrance. A petition was also filed asking for a small branch road of about quarter mile up the south fork of Robinson Creek, road the above proposed road, and the above viewers were also appointed to view out this road.

Supervisor Fairbanks was authorized to employ the county surveyor or his deputy to cross section and make profile maps of the first 5 miles of the proposed Two Rivers and Covelo road, beginning at the Two Rivers bridge and to employ all necessary assistants.

The application of Anna Latvala for \$12.50 per month for support of two minor children was ordered passed up to the state board of control for their approval. She to receive no money unless the said board of control passes favorable on the application.

In the matter of wood for the county farm and court house—The following was the only bid received.

Alex Kauhanen, 231 cords of stove and chunk wood, at \$5.99 per cord. After due consideration, the contract was awarded to said party. The wood to be black or live oak, or both, and to be cut from standing timber, and to be delivered on or before October 1st, 1913.

The following resolution was unanimously passed by the board, and a copy thereof ordered transmitted to the state highway commission: Resolved: That, inasmuch as this board does not approve of the attitude of some of property owners on the west side of Russian river, whereby exorbitant prices are asked for the rights of way for the California state highway, the California highway commission be requested to make a survey from Hopland to Ukiah on

The State and Game Commission recently gave notice to Miller and Perkins that they would both be laid off for a time, and instead of paying a salary would allow them to work on a commission. The state commission has consented to turn over all commissions made by Perkins to the Fort Bragg Associations in payment for his services. Perkins was immediately on the job when this order was made and arrested three men at Northspur last week who were fined \$20 a piece for illegal fishing.
