**BOYCOTTING POTATOES**

THE State Market Bureau last week announced that the total potato supply in California is twenty-five per cent less than at this time last year. Prices are about 250 per cent higher than they were at this time last year.

Some of the larger cities are combating the situation by a boycott on potatoes, instigated by the Housewives' League, and a number of restaurants have stricken the humble spud from their menu.

We of Mendocino county are more fortunately situated—if only we would take advantage of our opportunities. This county can produce potatoes second to none and if we would think more seriously of that home garden of which we have read so much—and done so little, there would be no shortage of potatoes.

Practically every family in Ukiah could grow sufficient tubers to supply their needs, if they would do it. Ellis Pollock is one of this city's home gardeners who has demonstrated that a lot of 60 feet by 100 feet is plenty large enough to grow a year's supply of potatoes, fruits and garden truck, and still he isn't cramped for space.

Our most effective weapon against high prices and the potato shortage is to go about this home garden in more than theory alone and grow the vegetables we require for home use.

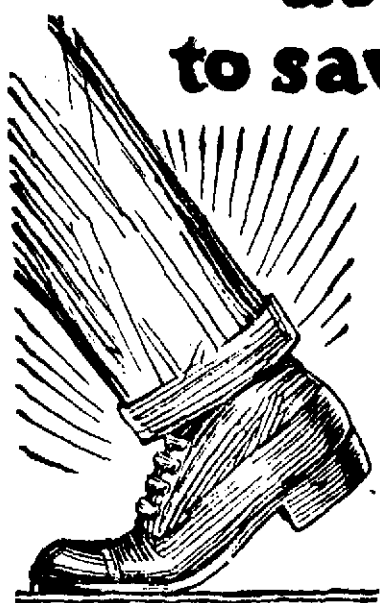
