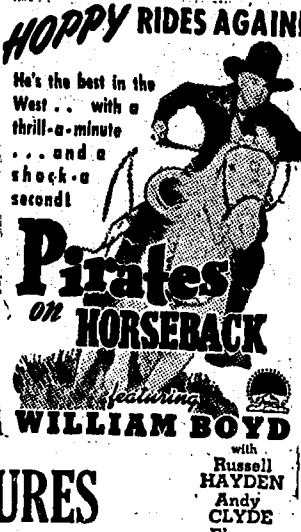

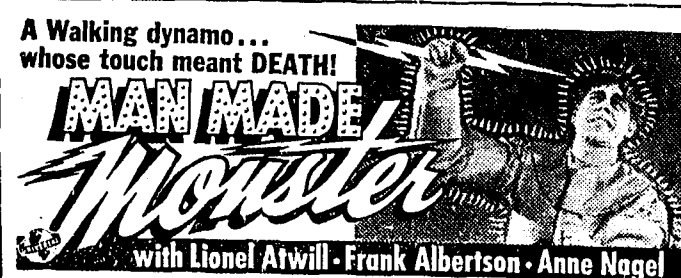

TRY THIS ON YOUR CAMERA—In getting a close-up photograph of the
world's oldest living thing, the General Sherman tree in Sequoia National
Park, ingenious Mike Roberts, photographer of Oakland, brought along
a forty-foot tower. He set it up, climbed on top and shot a full length
picture of the 274-foot high Sequoia Gigantea. This extraordinary direct-
color photograph is included in the Standard Oil Company of California
1941 collection of scenic views. The pictures in this collection, depicting
scenes along highways of the West, are being distributed by Standard
Service Men throughout the West. The distribution is being handled
through ninety-one zones on a rotating schedule with the release of a new
photographic print every two weeks. Under this plan a motorist may
collect several different pictures in a normal day's driving and a sizable
collection on longer trips.
