### Bidding and play are only trifles

"You were above reproach on that hand if we overlook two trifles," North remarked after the play of today's hand. "One trifle is that you should have

let me play the hand at five diamonds. The other is that you should have made three notrump." Strangely enough, South was not delighted with his partner's praise.

East put up the ten of spades at the first trick, and South won with the queen. South then tried the diamond finesse, losing to the king.

East returned the eight of spades, winning the trick. East's next spade enabled West to run the rest of the suit, defeating the contract.

North was quite right when he said that South should have made three notrump. South should refuse to win the first trick. When East continues with the eight of spades, South should again play low. (If South put up the queen, West would play low; and East would get in with the king of diamonds to lead his last spade.)

**Ends Danger**  
When East leads his last spade South plays the queen, and West can take his ace. That ends all danger from the spades. South wins any return and tries the diamond finesse. The defenders get the king of diamonds and three spades, but they cannot defeat the contract.

North was overstating his case when he said that South

should have let him play the hand at five diamonds, since he would go down against any reasonable defense. But North was counting on East to make the only "book" opening lead—the queen of clubs.

North would win with the king of clubs and would eventually win a finesse with the ten of clubs in the South hand. He would thus lose only one trump and the ace of spades, making his contract.

**Daily Question**  
Partner opens with one spade, and the next player passes. You hold: Spades A J 9 7 2, Hearts 10 4 3, Diamonds 6 2, Clubs 9 5 4. What do you say?

**ANSWER:** Bid two spades. You would jump to four spades if you had a side singleton in addition to your excellent trump support, but the actual hand simply isn't worth so high a bid.

## Etude Club scholarships audition schedule given

## No repayments from pipe firm, says director

Al Kruth, Ukiah's director of public works, told the Daily Journal today that he did not anticipate that the city would receive any repayments from American Pipe and Construction but he did not rule out the possibility that the state may yet uncover still further complicated connections between the Monterey Park firm and subsidiary contracting firms with which the city might have done business at one time or another.

The city has already received some \$10,000 in return of "over payments" from pipe contracts with other minor firms who were owned by one or more of the six firms named in addition to American Pipe. These payments were made after the state brought anti-trust court action against the firms and uncovered an intricate inter-relationship between contractors and the parent corporations.

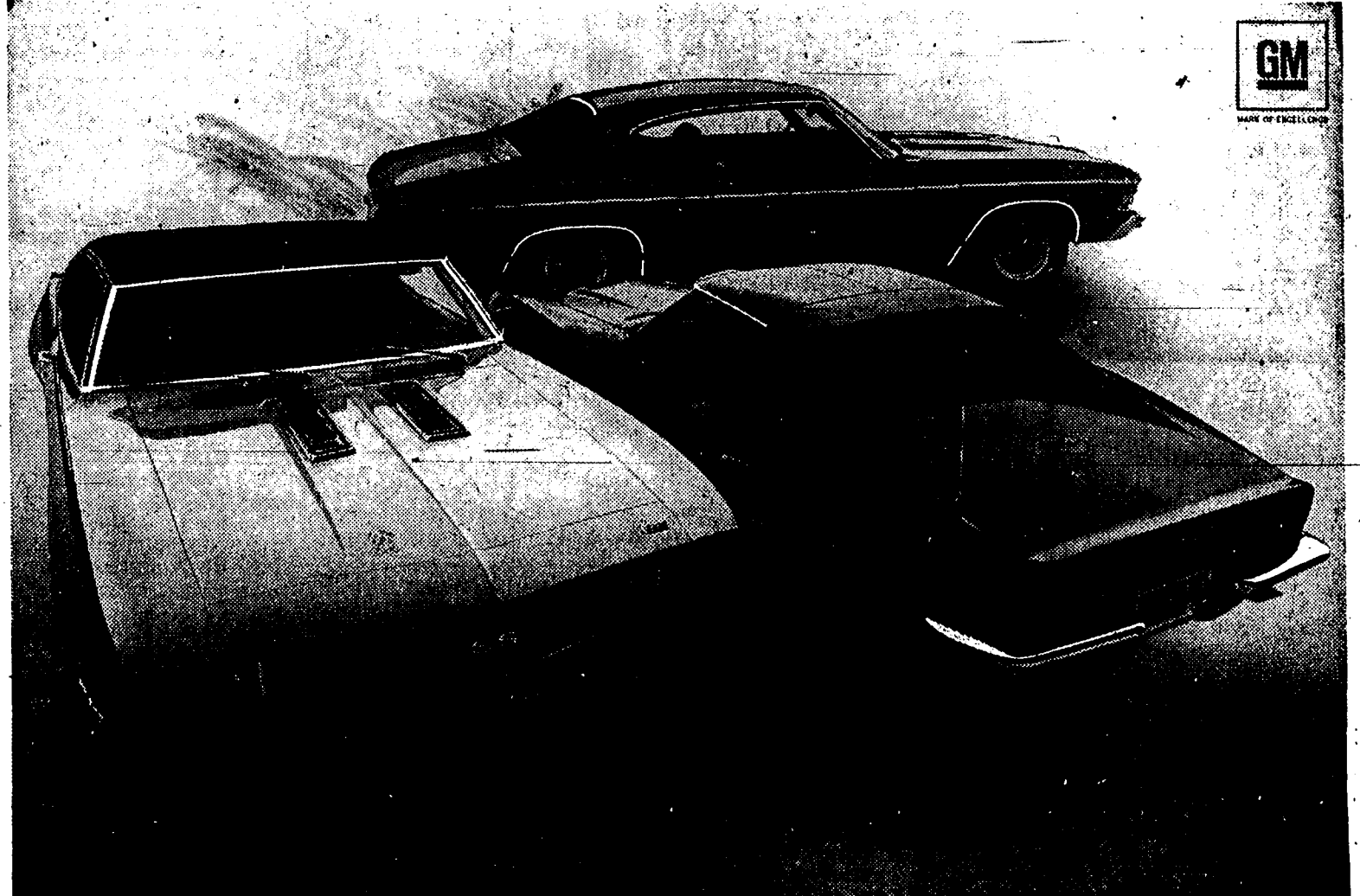
